More About Beckie Moore

Our First KHMA Executive Director!Beckie Moore was recently hired to serve as the first executive director of the Klipsch Heritage Museum Association. Her first day in office was Monday, February 28, 2022. Beckie is a Hope, AR native and has served as an executive director of nonprofit organizations for 26 years. It is quite ironic that her new office will be in the Klipsch Visitors Center, which is next door to the Clinton National Historic Site where Beckie began working in 1996 and served as director of the Clinton Birthplace

Foundation until 2000.

Beckie graduated from Hope High School and received her undergraduate degree from Henderson State University. Prior to entering the nonprofit field, Beckie was a high school English teacher. Not only has her nonprofit experience allowed her to live and work in Arkansas, but she has also worked in Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas before returning to her Arkansas roots after a 19-year absence. It was during her time in Tennessee that she completed work on her Masters in Nonprofit Management and Leadership.

In 2017, Beckie was excited to return to her hometown to serve as director of the Hope-Hempstead County Chamber because the move allowed her to live near her two grown sons and their families. Daniel (older son) and his family live in Hope while Joel (younger son) and his family live in Hot Springs, AR. Beckie is always ready to talk about her three grandchildren, Riley (12), Ella (10) and Madeline (4), and if you twist her arm (as we did), she'll show you their photos too.

During a recent KHMA Board of Trustees meeting, someone asked Beckie why she was interested in serving as director of KHMA. Beckie shared the following, "This organization will allow me to work alongside a group of volunteers who are passionate about honoring Paul W. Klipsch's life and work, and grow the Museum association." The Klipsch Heritage Museum Association has the opportunity to partner with Hope Public School District as STEaM education plans, programs and activities are put in place. Additional opportunities of service and growth include downtown business revitalization, historic preservation and tourism."









Artifacts

Feild House Period Listening Rooms

For about as long as we have owned it, the dream has been to establish period listening rooms. We have made some significant strides in this area, particularly due to the PWK Birthday Bash event.

The 1950's room features mid-50's Klipschorns that were donated by the El Dorado Baptist Church. The



speakers are powered with vintage Marantz electronics on loan to the Museum from Steve Rowell. Furnishings are on loan from a local antiques dealer, including chairs, an end table and lamp.

The 1970's room benefits from a generous Klipsch donation of rosewood Klipschorns that are powered

by a Sansui 3300 donated by Don and Deborah Grandia. A round oak table with chairs (not shown in photo) is from the Klipsch "company apartment" vintage 1975. Other furnishings are on loan from the antiques dealer.



Both rooms are works in progress. In addition to more furnishings, vintage sources such as turntables and tape decks, as well as program material, are needed.

Feild House Renovation Update

The Facilities team held our first work weekend of the year in February with the goal of completing the work on the theater room and doing some general cleanup in preparation of the PWK Birthday Bash celebration. Below are some final pictures of the theater room with the carpet and curtains installed, which we think turned out pretty nice!





We ended up cancelling our March work weekend due to various circumstances but will resume work in April. In the





meantime, a volunteer has started landscaping the front of the house and installing the updated HVAC ductwork to improve the airflow to the front of the house. Thanks to Beckie Moore and Jim Hunter for taking the lead on these projects.

On March 9th, we held the ribbon cutting and grand opening of the Feild House as the new new KHMA Visitors Center. It was quite gratifying to see the house finally being used for it's intended purpose. It's taken two years to get to this point and there is still a lot of work to do, but we are well on our way.



There are still things to accomplish on the first floor before turning our attention to the upstairs. In April, we began repainting the front and back porches, painting the front door, replacing a side entry door, and will hopefully get our handicap access ramp installed.





THE DOPE FROM HOPE GENESIS

The Dope from Hope concept appears to have gestated for seven years. Volume 1, Number 1 was published August 16, 1960. About seven years earlier, a letter to a salesman at Klipsch & Associates' NYC office (Klipsch Eastern) suggests the concept. Salesman Gene Altman was also a technical writer and proposed to PWK that he would like to write a magazine article.

Paul responded:

"This letter of yours dated 24 March was very interesting and I am in agreement with your plan. I suggest however, that instead of relying on me as the great source of wisdom that you go ahead and write as you would from your own mind. Of course it is realized that you are selling my product and that you may have to make it appear that you are leaning very heavily on "Dope from Hope" but I believe that if you write largely on your own responsibility it will have more force than if it bore my name as co-author, for example."

Paul goes on to offer his technical advice and support. Then he continues:

"Incidentally, we are thinking about a little publication of our own which we hope to print locally here in mimeograph form and try to hold the thing to one page. This would be brought out "occasionally" or more or less when the spirit moves somebody to write down some closely packed words of wisdom...

I think it would be very well to solicit ideas from wherever we can get them. It was my idea to distribute some 500 of these—say four or five of these to some 100 dealers—or something like that. At the present time we have only about 60 dealers...

I will [need] somebody else's help, advice and criticism on "The Dope from Hope" which is the proposed name of the publication here. I fully realize that some unsavory character is bound to point out that he infers that I am "The Dope"."

No further mention of the concept has been found. It took about seven years for the realizations of the benefits of horn efficiency and corner-loading to evolve into the Klipschorn. I guess The Dope from Hope just followed suit.

PS: Instead of indicating when the newsletter was issued by a "Volume # / Issue #" format, we use a military date format (as PWK did extensively), which is YYMMDD.

For example: 211115 indicates a date of Nov. 15, 2021
